MORIM PROJECT – ONE WEEK TOGETHER WITH TEACHERS FROM THE US

Between the 4th and 11th of November we welcomed teachers and leaders of the Dr. Miriam & Sheldon G. Adelson Educational Campus from Las Vegas, as part of the SOS International Morim Limmud Program. This is an international educational program enabling American and European Jewish schools to exchange best practices.

The guest teachers from Las Vegas were with us every morning from Monday to Friday: they visited and held lessons at our middle and high school, introduced their campus to our students and talked about living in Las Vegas. They also met, discussed and exchanged practices with our school's leadership, teachers, counselors and teachers of special education. They ended their week on Friday with a joint Kabbalat Shabbat where the American school's music teacher and two of our music teachers held a special performance together with our school's band and chorus singers in the Lauder assembly hall.

WE FELT LIKE STAYING THERE – THE 10TH GRADE STUDENTS' FIELDTRIP TO ISRAEL

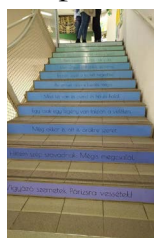
25 students from our 10th grade joined by some students from the Scheiber School spent 10 unforgettable days in Israel. One of our students wrote the following after the trip:

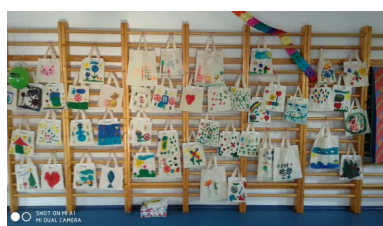

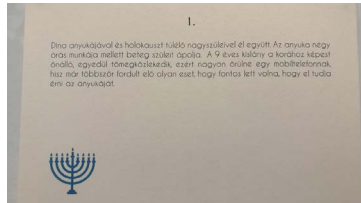
MUSIC CLUB

CROCUS PROJECT



The Crocus Project has participants from several schools in Hungary and in the European Union, aged 12-18. One part of the project is to plant crocus flowers, and the other is to complete a project related to the crocus plants until the spring, the Memorial Day for the Hungarian victims of the Holocaust. Students of the Lauder School planted the bulbs around the miniature of the “Shoes on the Danube” Memorial, which was recently put up in the school garden. They are now working on the common project, which will have to be completed by the time these flowers blossom in the spring.

Every year, we organize the Open Court Program for our 9th graders – this year, the students of Nahar. Through the program, they get an insight into the work of judges, prosecutors, lawyers, and get an understanding of the most important legal concepts and roles, of the trials and litigation.

Each year high school students have the opportunity to take part in our in-house debate competition. They have to choose and defend a position within previously given topics. This competition is a great opportunity to practice argumentation.

This year we had six teams for the following topics:

3. Handwriting had lost its significance in the 21st century
4. Small nations will disappear
5. Globalization kills local culture
6. Competitive sports have lost their original function

The competition was won by the MeNaPaSzu, an 11th grade team. The Brokkoli, a 9th grade team came second.



OUR EXHIBITION “MISSING CHAINS, BLAND TRACES” WAS OPENED IN LENTI



On November 9, 2018, our exhibition was opened in the Cultural Center in Lenti, commemorating the Jews deported from the town. There were over 100 guests at the opening ceremony, including László Horváth, the mayor of Lenti; Ági Berta, writer from Napoli; Dejan Suc, historian of Lendva; Piroska Virág, teacher; László Nógrádi and Tamás Suchman, former members of parliament, and several local and regional residents.

After many years of research, the exhibition returned the memory of 51 people to the place from which they were deported by the executors of brutal laws only because they were Jewish. Drawings by children from the Lauder Javne School in Budapest were also included in the exhibition.

The opening greetings of the exhibition all stressed the importance of remembrance, of personal history.
